If Increase:

Today, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) updated the incidence rate of autism among eight year olds in the United States. This updated report occurs every two years. The incidence rate released in April 2016 showed that 1 out of 68 children were living with an autism diagnosis. Today's incidence rate show the rate has increased to **1 out of ___eight year olds.**

For those involved in supporting the needs of individuals living with autism and their families, this increase is not surprising. Providers of services know that they are getting more calls for help than ever before. Unfortunately, the demands for help far exceed the available resources to assist an individual or his/her family.

Today, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) updated the incidence rate of autism among eight year olds in the United States. This updated report occurs every two years. The incidence rate released in April 2016 showed that 1 out of 68 children were living with an autism diagnosis. Today's incidence rate show the rate has decreased to **1 out of ___eight year olds.**

The updated incidence rate shows that, for the first time, the rate of autism is decreasing. What is causing this rate to decrease is not yet known, but what is known is that there are still over 3,000,000 people who have an autism diagnosis, and we must continue to address their needs on a daily basis.

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If at or near the same rate:

Today, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) updated the incidence rate of autism among eight year olds in the United States. This updated report occurs every two years. The incidence rate released in April 2016 showed that 1 out of 68 children were living with an autism diagnosis. Today's incidence rate show the rate has changed little in the last two years to now being to **1 out of ___eight year olds.**

The updated incidence rate shows that the rate of autism is staying the same. While the cause of autism is not known, we do know that there are over 3,000,000 people who have an autism diagnosis, and we must continue to address their needs on a daily basis.

Please note that the messages we wish to get across to our community and media are:

1. That each person with autism is deserving of a life full of dignity, value and respect, and a life where they can pursue options to always maximize their quality of life.
2. That the incidence rates are important to note, but also as important are that each statistic represents a person in need of the support and help of a nation.
3. That while it is important to understand autism through needed research, it is as important to be there for the over 3,000,000 people who today are autistic.

What is causing the incidence rate to increase/decrease?

While the rate of autism is increasing/decreasing among eight year olds, the actual cause of such an incidence has not been defined or is known. While there are often reasons suggested for this cause, the fact is that there is no defined cause for autism. Accordingly, it is not correct to link any suggested cause for this increase/or decrease.. There is also no cure for autism.
